



Genesis 5:1-26 – Genealogy Part 2

Observe:

Adam (vs. 1-3)

- 1) We have here the “book” of the first Adam who:
 - a. Was created in God’s image
 - b. At the fall, he took on a sin nature
 - c. Passed on his **dual nature** to his children (Gen. 9:6)
- 2) The “book” of the second Adam, Jesus Christ, will **restore** the first image and **remove** the second. (Gen. 3:15, Matthew 1:1)

Enoch (vs. 21-24) (Hebrews 11:5, Jude 14-15)

- 1) One of only two men to have been translated - **Elijah**
- 2) One of only two men to have “walked with God” - **Noah**
- 3) He was a prophet like Elijah who received revelation from God at the birth of his son – Methuselah means “**when he dies, it will come**” – referring to the Deluge.
- 4) Enoch was a man of faith demonstrated by obedience.

Lamech (vs. 28-31)

- 1) By the naming of Noah and his prophecy, he showed that he also was a man of faith who “believed God.”
- 2) Lamech’s prophecy was directly related to the curse on the ground and the difficult task that it was for the antediluvians to work out a living – God’s gift of **meat** to Noah eased the burden of their toil in providing additional food.

Noah (vs. 32)

- 1) It appears that he was limited to only three children and those from an advanced age. (Gen. 6:10, Gen. 9:18-19, 28-29)
